f YOU ARE COMING TO HELP ME, YOU ARE WASTING my time...but, if you are coming because your liberation is bound up with mine, then let us work together." This is a quote from an Indigenous Leader which truly depicts the essence of the Empowering Women Entrepreneurs conference, held at The Crossings in December. The Crossings teamed with the Empowering Women Entrepre-

neurs Alliance for a two-day educational and networking event for Empowering Women Entrepreneurs (EWE), held at The Crossings Leadership Retreat Center (LRC). The EWE conference, which was produced by FLOW, an organization cofounded by John Mackey, CEO of Whole Foods Market, and Michael Strong, was dedicated to liberating the entrepreneurial spirit for good.

"Our purpose this weekend is focusing on women entrepreneurs in developing countries...

not about us doing something for them but coming together," stressed Jeff Klein, executive director and chief activation officer for FLOW.

FLOW is a non-profit corporation promoting entrepreneurial initiatives that focus on the goals of

sustainable peace, prosperity and happiness for all, in our lifetime. FLOW advances its mission through its educational programs (Empowering Women Entrepreneurs, Peace Through Commerce, and Conscious Capitalism) and through publishing.

The co-sponsored interactive conference illuminated the importance of supporting women entrepreneurs in developing countries to help al-

leviate poverty. One fascinating way of doing so is through microfinance. This is a term for the practice of providing financial services, such as credit, savings and insurance, in small amounts, frequently less than \$100 (U.S.).

Microfinance and the Women's Economic Empowerment movement are gaining popular recognition as keys to peace and prosperity. Michael Strong, co-founder and chief visionary officer of FLOW stressed, "We are committed to elevating

awareness of the issue of women's economic empowerment to a level comparable to that of global warming and AIDS, with resultant attention and resources directed towards supporting women

Sangita Sigdyal, deputy director of the Microcredit Summit Campaign, spoke about how her organization brings practitioners, donor agencies, government leaders and other stakeholders to the table to forward the movement. Hopefully, by connecting to this campaign, local woman entrepreneurs can participate in this global effort to empower women and families.

Austin women entrepreneurs can also connect to the Whole Planet Foundation, a local nonprofit established by Whole Foods Market, that provides grants to microfinance institutions in Latin America, Africa and Asia. These institutions then develop and offer microenterprise loan programs, training and other financial services to the self-employed poor.

Whole Planet Foundation, partnering with 2006 Nobel Laureate Muhammad Yunus and others, is planning to launch an Austin Leadership Network in 2008 which will provide women entrepreneurs and others a chance to get involved in the mission and help plant seeds of economic prosperity around the globe through microlending.

The EWE interactive conference included presentations, discussions not only on microfinance but also economic freedom and entrepreneurial culture. These three components are viewed as the three principal elements of the women's economic empowerment system.



When I was ready to start work on my dissertation, I remembered those workshops and thought it would be interesting to study racism in white women who are not expected to be racist. A few people thought I was nuts to study that - they thought blatant racism was more important. It turns out that what I was tapping into - silent racism in well-meaning white people - is very important because silent racism accounts for much of the institutional racism that produces racial inequality.

AW: WHAT HAS BEEN THE REACTION TO YOUR BOOK FROM AFRICAN-AMERICAN **COLLEAGUES?**

BT: Silent Racism has been very well received in the black community. I did a workshop in Houston in August at the Center for Racial Healing, and the audience (about half black, half white) was very excited about the ideas in the book. Forty people attended the workshop, and the center sold 40 copies of Silent Racism.

Dr. Sherri Benn, director of Multicultural Student Affairs at Texas State, has been very enthusiastic about my work. After reading the book, she invited me to speak at the Leadership Retreat for Texas State minority leaders.

AW: WHO SHOULD READ THIS BOOK AND WHY?

BT: My goal is to get well-meaning white people to think differently about racism, to stop denying that they occasionally have racist thoughts, and that those thoughts may occasionally slip out or influence a decision they make. This is not easy to do because we are so used to thinking that racism is always hateful.

AW: WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO OTHER WOMEN WHO ARE WONDERING WHETHER OR NOT IT'S "TOO LATE" TO PUR-**SUE A NEW CAREER PATH OR PASSION?**

BT: I would say that it's NOT too late! I remember one of my sisters saying that she was very concerned when I decided to move to Austin after I finished the Ph.D. (remember, I was 56 at the time). I had no job, but I wanted to live in Texas. I couldn't find any teaching positions in the area at the time, so I signed up for a sixweek course at the Entrepreneur Association on how to start your own business. I figured that if I didn't find an academic position, I could become a diversity trainer.

About halfway through the course, I found out about a one-year teaching job at Texas State (Southwest Texas at that time). Eventually a tenure-track position opened up, and I was able to get it as well. I have never felt that my age worked against me. *
